

OPHTHALMOLOGY

Kate Myrna, DVM, MS, DACVO

October 2, 2024

Kate Myrna received her BA from Vassar College in 1998. She received her DVM from the Virginia-Maryland College of Veterinary Medicine in 2004. After a rotating internship in Saskatchewan and specialty internship, Dr. Myrna completed a Residency and Master's degree in Comparative Ophthalmology at the University of Wisconsin in 2010. Dr. Myrna has been teaching at the University of Georgia since the completion of her residency. She has been recognized for her teaching and engaging lecture style through the Zoetis Distinguished Teaching award, multiple student teaching awards and a Lilly Teaching Fellowship. In 2020 she received the VMX speaker of the year award for small animal. As all academicians do, Dr. Myrna balances teaching, mentoring residents, leading the ophthalmology service and furthering research. Dr. Myrna has authored or co-authored over 65 research abstracts and journal articles as well as multiple book chapters. Her research focuses on corneal wound healing, tear dynamics and the role of cortisol in corneal health. Dr. Myrna is a diplomate of the American College of Veterinary Ophthalmologists.

A selection of topics Dr. Myrna will discuss include:

What do the numbers mean? Have you struggled with getting and interpreting a Schirmer Tear Test? How about making your tonometer work consistently? In this session we will review the fundamentals of ophthalmic diagnostics including when to do them, when to skip them and when to doubt the results. Even fluorescein can lead you astray when dealing with deep or atypical ulcers! We will go through a number of cases and decide if the tests match the presentation. I will also answer all of your burning questions about ophthalmic testing! Dog Vision: What do they see. Does my dog see in black and white? Are cataracts a normal aging change? How well can we assess vision? How well do dogs actually see? In this session we will answer all of these questions and more! Learn about the color-blindness of dogs and cats. Thrill to the mysteries of testing if cats can see. Go through some cases and see if you can figure out why the patient is blind!

TRANSFUSION MEDICINE

Kari Beer, DVM, DACVECC November 13, 2024

Dr. Beer is a diplomate of the Medical Association and the Journal American College of Veterinary Emergency Critical Care (DACVECC). She obtained her veterinary degree from Michigan State University in 2009, and completed a oneyear internship in small animal medicine and surgery and a threeyear residency in small animal emergency and critical care medicine at the University of Pennsylvania in Philadelphia. Following her residency, Dr. Beer worked in academia for several years as a lecturer at the University of Pennsylvania and as an assistant professor at Michigan State University. She was thrilled to come back home to Michigan and join OVRS in December 2017.

Dr. Beer has been published in the Journal of the American Veterinary of Veterinary Emergency and Critical Care, and is actively involved in staff education and textbook contributions. After graduating from the University of Glasgow Dr. Robertson spent time in mixed animal practice then as a surgery intern followed by specialized training in anesthesia and analgesia including a PhD at Bristol University (United Kingdom). She is board certified in anesthesia and in animal welfare by the respective American and European Colleges. She has been a faculty member at the University of Saskatchewan, Michigan State University, and the University of Florida. In 2019 she received her certification as a Traditional Chinese Veterinary Medicine Palliative and End-of-Life practitioner by the Chi Institute of Chinese Medicine and holds a certificate in small animal acupuncture. She has published widely on the recognition and alleviation of acute pain in companion animals

and been a member of numerous practice guidelines committees for the American Animal Hospital Association. the American Association of Feline Practitioners, the International Society of Feline Medicine, and the World Small Animal Veterinary Association, She is the senior medical director of Lap of Love Veterinary Hospice, a large network of veterinarians dedicated to end-of-life care. Dr Robertson is a courtesy lecturer at the University of Florida's College of Veterinary Medicine.

RECOVER PROTOCOL FOR CPR

Mallory Olson, LVT, VTS

March 12, 2025

Mallory ioined the Oakland Veterinary Referral Services (OVRS) emergency team in 2007 and worked as a veterinary assistant in the emergency department while completing the veterinary technician program at Macomb Community College. She earned her veterinary technician license in 2010 and went on to complete her VTS in emergency and critical care in 2014. In 2015, Mallory joined the OVRS critical care department, where she developed a passion for nutrition with a focus on critically ill patients. She earned her VTS in nutrition in 2018. Her interests include assisted feeding (feeding

tubes and intravenous nutrition). transfusion medicine. and toxicology. Mallory and her family share their home with 4 cats (Kora. Uno. Ursula, and Earl) and a terrier mix named Ranger.

Mallory will discuss include: Aspects of BLS (basic life support), ALS (advanced life support) and post arrest patient management. Positioning and technique for chest compressions and ventilation. Intravenous access, drug therapies, defibrillation, transfusion, other considerations. Team approach to CPR and Post arrest patient care.
